'Tis the season of celebration!

Those well-versed with the LT calendar will know that March, April and May are busy months of the year — when hard work comes together to be recognised and celebrated. Music, flowers, tears, hope and pride abound!

This year, having sworn to never again hold two end of course celebrations in quick succession, we had the privilege of hosting not two but FOUR end of course celebrations—three of which happened in the same week. In true Learning Together style, Grendon, Warren Hill and Whitemoor made sure that the celebration days showcased, not only respect and gratitude for each other but, also, the fruits of everyone's learning and hard work.



Our Writing Together students and mentors in Whitemoor produced a powerful collection of work called 'Free Writers', beautifully illustrated by one of the group's writers, Isaac. All writers were presented with a copy of the anthology at the end of course celebration, which contains two pieces of writing from each student and mentor—a combination of poems, short stories and scripts. All of the writers read aloud from the anthology at the event. Dr Preti Taneja, who convened the course, described the writers as 'a group of fierce and brilliant new literary voices'. She's not wrong!

In Warren Hill, students celebrated the completion of our first Butler Law Course—a legal research course, which takes the contemporary challenges of accessing justice as inspiration, and galvanises students into action to improve the accessibility of legal knowledge in their chosen field. At our end of course celebration, students presented the resources that they have produced together, which span a wide range of legal areas —from Cat A reviews to legal self-representation in civil cases. Students' work was met with glowing praise from criminal justice practitioners, and an incitement for them to extend their work to new media and new topics. Jack and the Warren Hill team have a busy summer ahead, implementing feedback ready for the launch of the resources in early autumn.

Back in Whitemoor, we celebrated the second year of our philosophy and ethics course, 'The Good Life and the Good Society', led by Drs Beth Phillips and Ryan Williams. Highlights of the day included Chris' recital of Shakespeare's St Crispin's Day Speech from Henry V, and Arabella's exuberant leadership of her group's news report project presenting a vision of what the good life and the good society might look like in 20 years time. Friends and family gathered for the day to celebrate the achievements and hard work of all involved.



And last, but by no means least, our final celebration was at Grendon, where we brought to a close the fourth year of our 'Introduction to Criminology' course. Back by popular demand, we welcomed creative talent, and friend, Joelle Taylor, who spoke about 'poetry, power and a politics of togetherness'. Further highlights included music by a joint 'Grenbridge' choir, in partnership with Joe Shaw and Sing Inside, a talk by Gareth and Jack about Learning Together beyond Grendon, and powerful reflections from Shahid, Chris, Max, Muzzaker, Daniel, Daley, Jake and Julianna about their course experiences and hopes for the future. We were also thrilled to welcome back Zaheer, from Ford, who was the brains behind the Learning Together mug... more of which, next...

Congratulations!

In just over six months, since the last newsletter, members of our community have done some amazing things! Here are just a few:

New studies: Gina and Craig from Whitemoor have begun their MST in Penology at the Institute of Criminology in Cambridge, Chris from Whitemoor has just finished his Open Degree with the OU, Obi and Ben from Grendon are taking steps to begin their degrees and some of our Whitemoor students' children are beginning degrees and joining Learning Together communities within the Network.

New jobs: Megan is now leading a Master's course in criminology at Leeds University (see page 4), Marc from Springhill is working for the Prison Reform Trust, Zaheer is training at the Timpson Academy, Laura has moved from the Ministry of Justice to the Home Office and Nick is working hard as a fettleer.


Awards and funding: Patrick received funding for his PhD, the LT Cambridge office received funding from the Cambridge Humanities Grant Scheme and British Academy to do follow up interviews with LT students and funding from the ESRC to host a conference in Argentina, and Amy was a finalist in the Law Teacher of the Year award.

Terrific transitions: Dean, Nick, Ahmed and Marc from Grendon and Ben from Warren Hill have now all progressed to open conditions, Tom and Iain will join them soon. Jay and Adam have progressed to new Category C establishments, with Keith from Whitemoor hot on their heels. Some of our students have been downgraded from High Risk and Cat A. John and Nick have returned to the community and are working hard up in Manchester and down in Kent.

New publications: Jack's article on solitary confinement for YOs was published in the March issue of the Prison Service Journal, Gareth, Amy and Ruth wrote a chapter with Shadd Maruna, Ellie Price and Jon Reed called *Experiencing Time on Death Row*, which was published in *Living on Death Row: The Psychology of Waiting to Die* (April, 2018), Bob and Geri's *Imprisoned Fathers* is expected to be published in the Prison Service Journal in July, and Moses and Ellie's Poems were exhibited at the Heong Gallery in Cambridge in May.

Drawing Connections

Our creative leader, Rebecca, has begun an artistic residency at Whitemoor, working especially on D and F wings. Through *Drawing Connections*, Rebecca uses creativity to build community and promote wellbeing. Activities so far have included creative explorations of mathematical ideas in nature, a large community tree mural, and clay modelling, working with LT's multi-talented administrator, Lisa.



WhatsApp Doc?

Learning Together sisters and brothers are doing amazing things—it's hard to keep up with it! With continued national and international growth, and ever more prison-based students returning to the community, we have created a WhatsApp group—called LT Family—as a way of everyone staying connected. WhatsApp is a mobile phone application that lets lots of people chat together as a group to share news, ideas and progress. So far, 23 people have joined. We have had a few impromptu 'best photo' and 'quotes of the day' competitions, but the main thing is knowing that there are loads of people rooting for you—a network of motivation and support. The power of community!

Earlier this year, a call for help went out to our community, from Megan (Grendon, 2016), who asked us to share our thoughts about whether prisons are criminogenic. Megan hoped that our contributions would enliven debate among her students at the University of Leeds. Megan received an amazing response. In her email of thanks, she wrote:

I would like to thank all of you who wrote a response to my question. My students were really inspired by your contributions and many have been moved to choose this essay question. There was an overwhelming consensus among the students that more can be done to rehabilitate people whilst in prison [...] One student also suggested that more community links need to be made between those in society and those in prison which I thought really reflected of all the work we have done together through the Learning Together community! Our new HE Funding Guide to help build on Learning Together

Responding to these experiences, over the last six months, we have worked hard to pull together a new HE Funding Guide, designed especially with our prison-based students in mind. Our Guide sets out sources of available funding for further study, as well as full details of application criteria and processes.

We hope that this guide will help members of our community who are passionate about education to take positive next steps in realising their educational ambitions. UCAS bans the box from its application form



Change is afoot to how UCAS (the UK's leading universities admissions body) requests information about people's criminal convictions when they apply to study higher education courses at college and university.

Two questions are currently asked by UCAS about criminal convictions in the online application form. The first asks applicants to declare unspent convictions. This will be removed before the next cycle of university applications (i.e. for students hoping to begin their studies in September 2019). The second question (which will remain) relates to criminal convictions which would appear on a DBS records check and only applies to courses that have a placement element e.g. a teaching course which requires a placement in a school.

As a community of enthusiastic learners, we have been involved in this campaign and are excited about the potential of this decision. More news to follow soon!
